Brief Background

On January 15, 1908, Howard University brought forth the world’s most unique and versatile group of women who organized into the body of Alpha Kappa Alpha. Its purposes, envisioned by Ethel Hedgeman Lyle and 15 other women, have applied to every transformation presented to the African-American community throughout the 20th Century. From this vision, Alpha Kappa Alpha became an incorporated body on January 29, 1913. The sorority has grown into a force of nearly 300,000 collegiate members and alumnae, constituting over 1,000 chapters. Alpha Kappa Alpha has provided inspirational leadership, enduring services, and unifying sisterhood for 112 years and will continue to strengthen local communities, the nation, and the world.

On December 17, 1947, Delta Tau Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.® was chartered in Lansing, Michigan with the purpose of encouraging high scholastic values and achievement, promoting ethical standards, and providing community service for the benefit of the Greater Lansing community. Specifically, the presence of Delta Tau Omega has enhanced the climate and enriched the culture for African Americans in the Greater Lansing community. Delta Tau Omega has decades of service and participation in various civic, religious, political, and educational endeavors in the Lansing community and beyond.

Delta Tau Omega Chapter Scholarship Opportunities

Delta Tau Omega Chapter awards several college scholarships yearly to Greater Lansing area high school seniors. These scholarships are awarded at the chapter’s annual Senior Salute and Scholarship Luncheon. Senior Salute is the chapter’s signature community program. Students are nominated by their high school administrator (counselor or principal) to participate in Senior Salute. These nominated students are then invited to register to attend the luncheon and apply for our college scholarships. On average, the chapter awards six scholarships yearly.

Chapter Scholarships

Delta Tau Omega Chapter Senior Salute

Senior Salute began in 1980 as a vehicle to publicly recognize African-American high school seniors in Greater Lansing for their efforts in securing an education and graduating. Each spring, Delta Tau Omega Chapter holds the Senior Salute and Scholarship Luncheon. The purpose of Senior Salute is three-fold: 1). Recognize African-American graduating seniors in the Greater Lansing area. 2). Acknowledge the special accomplishment of honor students who have earned at least a 3.5 cumulative GPA. 3). Award college scholarships. Senior Salute is Delta Tau Omega's way of honoring and congratulating students for achieving this academic milestone and thanking their families, teachers and administrators who made the financial and emotional investments in their students' success.



The Marguerite K. Gooden Scholarship was developed to recognize the tireless work of Marguerite Gooden as a dedicated educator in the Lansing Public Schools for over 30 years. Mrs. Gooden received her B.S. in Sociology from Prairie View State University and M.A. in History from Michigan State University. Upon earning her graduate degree, Mrs. Gooden taught at Walter French Junior High School and J. W. Sexton High School. She served the Lansing School District from September 1, 1956 to June 15, 1984. Mrs. Gooden loved teaching mathematics and science and always desired to see more students pursue these disciplines in college.

Criteria:

1. African American female graduating senior enrolled at J.W. Sexton High School. 2. Low-income (based on family household income) and first-generation college student. 3. Minimum GPA 2.5. 4. Pursue a STEM major in college.

The Clara Betty Anderson Scholarship was established in honor of Mrs. Anderson's work and dedication to the field of nursing and healthcare. Mrs. Anderson received her Master's degree in Nursing Education from the University of Chicago and Master's degree in Special Education from Michigan State University. Her nursing career in the Lansing area began at St. Lawrence Hospital as an Assistant Director of Nursing Education. She worked as an In-Service Director and Staff Nurse at Sparrow Hospital until her retirement in 1983. Mrs. Anderson joined the Lansing School District in 1960 as a teacher for hospitalized children. She taught home-bound children and math to 7th through 9th graders and worked as a part-time school nurse until her retirement in 1984.

Criteria:

1. Minimum GPA 2.5. 2. Pursue nursing or a healthcare related major in college.

Delta Tau Omega Chapter's **HBCU Scholarship** supports a Lansing area high school student who has applied and been admitted to a Historically Black College or University. HBCUs offer all students, regardless of race, an opportunity to develop their skills and talents. These institutions train young people who go on to serve domestically and internationally in the professions as entrepreneurs and in the public and private sectors.

Criteria:

1. Minimum GPA 2.5. 2. Applied and accepted to an HBCU.

The Dorothy A. Kennedy/L. Margaret Groves Keepers of the Dream Scholarship is through the Educational Advancement Foundation, a 501(c)3 entity of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. Groves, along with 11 other accomplished women, chartered Delta Tau Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. on December 17, 1947. They both held influential and leadership positions in the chapter. Mrs. Kennedy remained active until her passing in 2013; and Mrs. Groves continues to be an active member of the chapter.

Criteria:

1. Demonstrates leadership skills, community service and/or civic engagement. 2. Minimum GPA 3.0.

The Dr. Olivia Letts Commitment to the Dream Scholarship is through the Educational Advancement Foundation, a 501(c)3 entity of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc. Dr. Letts was the first African American hired by the Lansing School District and continues to be a pillar in the Greater Lansing community since her arrival in 1951.

Criteria:

1. Demonstrates community service skills and civic engagement. 2. Minimum GPA 2.7. 3. Graduating high school senior from a Lansing school.

In addition to the above named scholarships, Delta Tau Omega Chapter awards one or two **general scholarships** each year. These scholarships are not tied to specific college major/academic interest or institutional type (i.e. HBCU). Scholarship recipients are recognized annually at the Chapter's Senior Salute and Scholarship Luncheon.
